






Christmas Message 2025: Archbishop Richard Smith







Pilgrims of Hope 2025

Jubilee year 2025 starts December 24, 2024, until January 6, 2026.

Jubilee year is traditionally proclaimed by the universal church every 25 years. Originally celebrated in the Hebrew tradition every 50 years, to free slaves and forgives debts, the Christian Jubilee was started in 1300 by Pope Boniface VIII for special year of grace and forgiveness.

“Pilgrims of Hope”, is the theme chosen by Pope Francis for this Jubilee year 2025.

It began with the opening of the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica on December 24, 2024, and will conclude on January 6, 2026. His message is for the Church to experience personal encounter with the Lord Jesus, the “door” of our salvation, giving “hope” to all, strengthening and renewing our faith in Jesus, to bring unity, love, and care for one another.

The Pope invites every one of us to embark on a pilgrimage of hope, so that through our witness, we may spread hope to others. Pilgrimage is one among the many acts of piety through which we can obtain plenary indulgences through the merits of Christ and saints.

On August 14, 2025, we feel blessed to be able to join our local parish of St Joseph the Worker in Richmond BC to a one-day pilgrimage to the Shrine of Sto. Nino de Cebu, Agassiz, BC. About 125 pilgrims participated in this journey of faith to the Shrine in Agassiz to commemorate the 500 years of Christianity in the Philippines. We prayed the rosary and had Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament in the small quaint chapel, had lunch and fellowship with fellow pilgrims, concluding our visit with Vigil Mass for the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Our most recent trip to Poland, Central Europe, and Medjugorje during the last week of September to mid-October 2025, was called the Pilgrimage of Mercy and Miracle.

We visited different cathedrals, basilicas, palaces and monastery, gaining more knowledge and understanding of history, culture and spirituality of the people in this part of Europe. Their faith challenged by wars and political conflicts reflects their resiliency relaying messages of hope, strength and renewal of faith to visiting pilgrims.

The icon of the Black Madonna at Jasna Gora Monastery, represents their deep faith in God and the blessed Mother, evidenced by their devotion today for its miraculous and divine intervention during various political invasion of their country, calling the icon of the Blessed Virgin as Queen of Poland.

Walking up the Wawel Hill, the panoramic view of the city of Krakow Poland was a sight to behold on a sunny cold October morning. The Wawel complex housed the Wawel Cathedral, royal castle, royal tombs, museum with royal treasures, tapestries and many other significant political and religious items dating back to the 10th century. Across the entrance door to the Wawel Cathedral is the bigger than life image of Pope John Paul, for this is where he celebrated his first Mass following his ordination to priesthood in 1946 and appointment as bishop in 1958.

The day we visited the camp at Auschwitz brought sadness in our heart, listening and reliving the human sufferings behind the walls of the barracks, as our knowledgeable guide relates the history of one of the cruelest assaults on humanity. St Maximilian Kolby was a prisoner in this camp who offered his life to save another prisoner.

We also visited the Divine Mercy Shrine in Łagiewniki, Poland, where St Faustina received messages from Jesus as written in her diary. Our pilgrimage included a visit to the Church of Our Lady Victorious in Prague with the icon of the Infant Jesus.

Praying and meditating on the rosary as we stepped on the rugged stones of the Apparition Hill in Medjugorje, our group was filled with hope and encouragement for one another. The climb on Cross Mountain the following day was even more challenging. Stunning views of Medjugorje await those capable of reaching the very top of the mountain. The hill is steep, with sharper rocks to step on. We prayed the Stations of the Cross as a group and silently offered our individual intentions. Medieval cathedrals in the Diocletian Palace in Croatia heightened our understanding of the long history of Catholicism and the mystery of God.

Each pilgrim site we visited brought us an appreciation of the beauty of the Lord's creation, a realization of the vulnerability of humans to destroy, the capability to rebuild, and resiliency to adapt. Behind all political conflicts and war, one rises back individually or as a nation in the strength of our divine Creator. The prayers and intentions we carried as we crossed every threshold and every step over each "door" of our pilgrimage site transformed us profoundly both in wisdom and knowledge, enriching and guiding us to deepen our spiritual direction in life.

Jubilee 2025, with its message of hope, will soon be a part of our meaningful past. As pilgrims of this earthly life, we take every step with courage and confidence, knowing Jesus is at our side.

OUR JUBILEE PILGRIMAGE EXPERIENCE: WALKING THROUGH THE HOLY DOORS: By Jun & Lalaine Soliven



When we signed up for what we thought would be a scenic spiritual tour through some of Europe's most storied cities, we had no idea we were stepping into one of the most sacred years in the Catholic Church: the Jubilee Year. On our pilgrimage, the Lord blessed us not only with holy places to visit but with holy ministers to walk beside us. With our priest (Fr. Deyre Azcuna), we met Christ in the sacraments; with our Deacon Norber, we met Christ the servant. At first, we thought it would just be a trip to a holy place, but as we walked, prayed, and reflected, we realized it was also a journey of the heart. As a married couple, we saw this pilgrimage not just as a spiritual journey, rather, it embodies the idea of walking life's journey hand in hand-with each other and with God.

One of the most powerful symbols of the Jubilee is the Holy Door. We were blessed with the rare and life changing opportunity to enter through the Holy Doors of the four major basilicas: St. Peter's Basilica, St. John Lateran, St. Mary Major, and St. Paul Outside the Walls. Traditionally sealed shut outside of Jubilee years, these doors are opened only during this sacred time, signifying the extraordinary pathway of mercy God extends to His people.

As we approached the grand façade of St. Peter's Basilica, we were immediately struck by the majesty of the Holy Door, adorned with scenes of redemption and grace. Stepping toward the Holy Door, we were reminded that Christ Himself is the door. "I am the gate; whoever enters through me will be saved" John 10:9. This threshold is more than stone and bronze-it is a passage of grace, from burden to freedom, from death into life. Our hearts carried prayers, burdens, hopes, and regrets. Others touched the door gently, as if greeting something sacred. In that moment, we felt part of a living faith that spans centuries, shared by countless others who've come in search of healing, clarity, or simply closeness to God. As we passed through the Holy Door, we weren't the same as when we arrived. It felt providential that this moment coincided with Pope Francis's wake. To step through the Holy Door at the same time was like entering more deeply into the very message he lived and preached. As we walked in solemn procession around the casket of Pope Francis, guided by the simple rope that marks our path, we join a great multitude of witnesses. The body of the Holy Father lies in quiet repose, guarded with dignity, yet his spirit and his teaching continue to speak to the church and to the world.

The Holy Door of St. Mary Major Basilica (Basilica di Santa Maria Maggiore) in Rome is one of the four Holy Doors of the major papal basilicas. Though less universally recognized than the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica, it carries equal spiritual significance and plays a vital role in the liturgical celebrations of Jubilee Years. It is one of the most beautiful Marian churches in the world. Once inside, we were enveloped by the warmth and serenity of this sacred space, which houses the relics of the Holy Crib. Passing through the door felt like walking into the embrace of a loving mother.

As we step through the Holy Door of the Lateran Basilica, we were reminded that this threshold is not just a doorway of stone, it is also a passage of grace. As the Cathedral of the Bishop of Rome –the Pope- St. John Lateran is known as the “Mother and Head of all Churches in the City and the World”. It is the official ecclesiastical seat of the Pope and the oldest of the four major papal basilicas and the first legally recognized Christian church in History. Entering through its Holy Door was a moment of symbolic rebirth, especially after reflecting on the beautiful inscription above the door: “Porta Sancta”. Its Holy Door is a powerful symbol of conversion, grace, and reconciliation.

St. Paul Outside the Walls- The final Holy Door we entered was that of St. Paul’s. Built over the tomb of the Apostle to the Gentiles, this basilica invited us to reflect on the missionary call of our faith. Walking through its Holy Door, we felt Paul’s fervor to spread the Gospel stirring within us, urging us to witness with courage in our own lives.

Each Holy Door we crossed marked a step deeper into the mystery of God’s mercy. The Jubilee year reminds us that we are all pilgrims, journeying not only to Rome, but toward the eternal home Christ prepares for us. Even though there were moments when we felt tired, we realized that these challenges could be offered up like small crosses, just as Jesus carried His own.

During our pilgrimage, we were blessed to visit many beautiful churches. A few of them, Our Lady of Victory with the Infant Jesus of Prague, Our Lady of Czestochowa—the Black Madonna in Poland, the Shrine of Divine Mercy, is where the message of Divine Mercy originated, which Christ himself wished to pass on to our generation also in Poland, and the famous Salt Mines of Wieliczka, a splendid underground complex of chambers, chapels and statues sculpted from salt.

As we look back on this pilgrimage, we realize that the physical journey was only the beginning. The true grace of the Jubilee lies in the transformation of our hearts- hearts renewed in mercy and strengthened in faith. The pilgrimage ends, but the mission continues, as we return home renewed in spirit, and guided by God’s unfailing light.



My Devotion to the Senior Santo Niño

I was born and raised in a small town located high up on a plateau, ten kilometers away from the capital city of Tagbilaran in the province of Bohol, Philippines. Legend has it that a very welcoming and courteous people met the Spanish conquistadors upon their arrival, so much so that they named the place Cortés. The town's parish is solemnly dedicated to the Most Holy Child Jesus (Señor Santo Niño).

It was within the sacred walls of the parish church that I was baptized into the faith and where I received the sacraments that nourished my Christian life. Together with other members, our group celebrates the feast of the Child Jesus every January of the year.

Novena prayers are said in households as the image of the Santo Niño is being passed around. This catholic tradition honours Jesus' sacred infancy and the virtues of innocence, humility, and childlike trust He embodied. Just like a child, my family and I submitted and committed our total dependence to our loving Santo Niño, who is the originator and source of both physical and spiritual life.



Just recently, a big event honouring the third anniversary of the installation of the Holy Child's Shine at the St. Anthony of Padua Parish in Agassiz, BC was celebrated. The Viva Senior Santo Niño of BC members honored and offered a traditional Sinulog dance as a tribute to His Righteousness and Glory. Our group is one of the many active associations whose devotion emphasizes trust in the Holy Child's mercy and power to earnest prayer and fosters a deeper appreciation for His humble infancy.



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4. That most of the millionaires made their fortunes in Real Estate and or included Real Estate as part of their investments.
5. That Real Estate is not a quick money investment but follows the principle of buy and hold.

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
